	Reduction targets: e.g. 20%, 50%, 80% Cups & food containers for reuse: Own cups and reuse systems Demotivating fees for single use items imposed on customers Bans at public events, in public authorities' buildings, canteens	Attached caps and lids to the bottles Min recycled content 80% is possible today in DRS countries! Min. 50% is proposed - in line with industry pledges	 Guaranteed cost coverage by industry for: Awareness raising at national level Collection systems Litter clean ups Data gathering and reporting Obligatory EPR systems for group E* and fishing gears	To achieve high collection targets for recycling, at the level of 90%, deposit systems are recommended. Standard European DRS is Centralized Non-for-profit Financed by producers and majority of schemes cover plastic, metal and glass packaging.
