

	Flow diagram	All retailers who sell beverages are required to take back the empty beverages they sell plus some redemption sites. There are currently over 2,300 return locations, including 25 redemption centers (276 RVMs), 30 BottleDrop Express sites, and 2,254 retail drop off sites (360 RVMs).
